

This historical narrative is written to relate some of the information relative to the beginnings of The Bay Indies Evangelical Covenant Church. It is based on facts, figures, remembrances, and reflections. When applicable some of the information is documented by Southeast Conference Board minutes and/or Rev. Olund's personal Record Book and notes.

Rev. Olund's personal commitment was "To Know Him and to Make Him Known". In his ministry here at Bay Indies it was his desire to create a congregation of "People Who Care". With Roy's personal health problems – kidney stone attack, acute pancreatitis, gall bladder surgery, major heart attack and then cancer – we came to experience the kindness and support of "People Who Care".

Our years spent in Venice with the Bay Indies and Venice Isle Churches were memorable happy years. They were filled with wonderful Friendships, meaningful experiences and many evidences of God's Faithfulness and Goodness.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude to God that we were given the privilege to be a part of his ministry.


UNTIL HE COME

And so we rest content, and let Him lead the way.





EGG CASSEROLE FOR EASTER BREAKFAST

12 Slices of white bread, buttered and cubed

1/2 lb. Velveeta (or comparable brand) cheese, cubed

1 tea Salt

6 Eggs, slightly beaten

1 quart Milk

Mix eggs and milk; pour over bread, add salt and cheese mixture and mix well.

Place in buttered casserole. (For the Easter breakfast please use cake pan, size 9 x 12 or similar.) Refrigerate overnight. Set out to room temperature at least 1/2 hour before baking.

Bake one hour at 350.

Fry bacon and crumble over top or sprinkle top with Bacon Bits. May also be prepared without bacon of any kind.

The casserole will puff up and then fall slightly.

Makes a full dish.

Tea Talk between Mary Ankrom and Mary Ann Olund

On how Bay Indies Covenant Church was started.





MaryAnn

I had to be talked into doing this because I'm not sure church is as interesting to some of you as it is to some of us. But I'm happy to share this experience, but I've got to tell you this first, I'm from Minnesota and you know you can't take Minnesota out of the girl. You can take the girl out of Minnesota, but you don't take out her feelings of Minnesota. The first year we were married, we came on a vacation trip to Florida with Roy's parents. And my reaction was "how can those people stand that heat, and humidity. I would never want to live in Florida." Well, my grandmother lived here for the winter months, maybe in my 70's I might consider coming for the winter like she did. But **NEVER** would I live there. Well, we were living mostly in the Midwest and serving a church in DeMoine, lowa when my husband got a call to a Covenant Church in Vero Beach on the east coast. It was a small church and couldn't afford to fly him down to speak with the church council or the church board. He wasn't real sure and meanwhile I was praying. I had just gotten this beautiful new black coat with a real mink collar. How could I use that in Vero Beach, Florida? I knew I was married to a minister, so you're willing!! And if you are a committed Christian you go where the Lord calls you. Well, Roy did not feel comfortable going to a church where he had not met them and discussed what their plans were for the future, so he declined that invitation. Well, while we were in the Midwest we enjoyed going to Colorado for a vacation. There was a particular restaurant that we liked to stop at and as we stopped there the one year they had a contest on and we signed up. It was for some vacation days in Florida. Well, you are smart enough to know it was one of those land deals, but we didn't. Well, lo and behold, we won the trip. So we planned our vacation the following summer on going to Florida and we had accommodations over on the east coast. We had a delightful time, but, of course, it was a land promotion thing for Lehigh Acres. So that is where the Covenant got the ideal that we might be interested in Florida, because while we were visiting Lehigh we learned that they were giving out large parcels of ground to church denominations to develop a church. Well, this sounded wonderful to Roy, and he was so excited about it, so as soon as we got home, he called the Covenant office and he told them all about it. Well, they were a little smarter than we were. They determined that was interesting, but nothing they would do anything about. But I think possibly that is where they go the idea where Roy might be interested in going to Florida.

Mary Ankrom

We would like to know about Venice and the idea of a church here in Bay Indies.

MaryAnn

Well, Roy received a call to go to St. Pete in Pinellas Park. They were going to be starting a new church. He as being called as a developer pastor from the home missions department of the Covenant. This sounded great to me. Our children were 13, they were confirmation age, I thought good, they can be confirmed at First Covenant Church in St. Pete. I checked on special education for DiAnn. We were pretty excited about going. I had not finished my college education and I was one of those who always wanted to have done that, so I had gone back while we were living in a college town to finish my college education. I was finishing up that year when he received this call to go to Florida. He was to come down earlier than the children and I and one week before he was to leave, he received this call that the Covenant has changed their mind. This place in Pinellas Park was not ready to begin a new church but there was a place in Venice, Florida where they could possibly begin new church work. Well, obviously you get out the maps – Venice, Florida?? We couldn't even find it on the map. They told us it was near Port Charlotte. Well, it was like a pin hold on the map. So we found Port Charlotte. And I'm telling you, I was upset. How could the Covenant, one week before Roy is to leave, decide a major decision like this for our lives. Now Roy handled it much better than I, but it just did not seem right to me, and I was really anxious about how this was going to work out, but you know the story, the Lord worked it all out in many good details and the reason they were looking a Venice, we did have some trailer park ministries in Sarasota and Bradenton. We had a trailer park ministry – I said trailer park, excuse me, Mobile Home Park, I can't believe I said that (it was noted that back in 1972 they were called trailer parks). Gordon Holmen was pastoring Trailer Estates in Tri Par Estates and at Trailer Estates Leonard Burch was the park manager. He was very familiar with the kind of role that the church could play in a mobile home park. And he was coming as the new manager at Bay Indies. So when they met to talk to the owners of Bay Indies, I am sure Leonard Burch put in a good word since he was familiar with the type of ministry and so that is why Bay Indies was chosen and contacted. Bay Indies, in its early infancy, agreed to have a church in the park.

Mary Ankrom

MaryAnn, you no sooner got a church here in Bay Indies on October 1, 1972, and at the end of October Pastor then developed a church at Venice Isle. Now he needed two churches. Tell us how that happened.

MaryAnn

Well, I'm quite sure that was a suggestion of the Covenant. We came down under the auspices of the home mission's department. They paid our salary and I think because the other two mobile home ministries here were served by a pastor serving two different parks, they thought that should probably be done. There was a group that had contacted Venice Isle and I might say that Venice Isle was not open to having a church in the beginning, but that was revisited by the group and by the park manager putting in a plug and, so yes, we began services at Venice Isle, with the service starting at 9:30 at Venice Isle and 11:00 here at Bay Indies. Now our children being teenagers, we wanted to see them in a Youth Group or in Sunday School programs, so the summer we came down Roy was filling in for other ministers who were on vacation. We were looking around and found that Venice Bible Church was a church where we would like to have our children go to and it fit into our schedule. What we would do, because in those days we came in one car, we went to Venice Isle, dropped Roy off, then I drove over to

Venice Bible, dropped the kids off, then I went back to Venice Isle for church, then we gave the kids directions that as soon as Sunday School was over, they should start walking down that road on Shamrock Blvd. and when the service was over we picked them up and headed for Bay Indies. So that is how we started out with the two services and with our children until David was old enough to drive and we could do the two-car thing.

And where did you meet here in Bay Indies at first for a church?

MaryAnn

Well, we met in Indies Hall. At that time Roy had been here in the summer getting acquainted with people and we had been going to some of the activities, but basically, we were the set-up staff. We set up the chairs, we had the picture that we still use, the head of Christ, this had been a gift to us from our first church in the fifties, and we decided we would use that as the central point of worship. That was hung at the back hall in Indies, you remember those big, flowered green and yellow drapes that were there for many years, well we bought a taupe table and much to my excitement I had gotten a new dinner cloth that fit in just the color with those drapes, so we covered the table with that. We had been given some altar appointments by the group at Lake Village. They had tried to start the church there, but that did not go, so we received some of their appointments and a small little organ to start with. But our Saturday procedure was to come and set up the chairs in Indies Hall, then I don't really recall, but Roy did the bulletins and it seemed to me we had a old copying machine in our garage, I'm not sure, but I know it was one of those crank kinds, you know you crank by hand, and you have to slip sheet with papers, so David was his assistant in those areas. Roy typed the bulletins himself; he did the bulletins Saturday night. Our job was to fold bulletins, then we would run, I say run because that is how I felt, after Venice Isle to Bay Indies, carrying some flowers because we had to transport them between the two because we didn't have everything for the two places, until some kind gentleman at Bay Indies felt sorry for us and he did buy a permanent plant so that we didn't always have to keep going back and forth. Soon we got vases for both places too. But we set up the chairs and the altar, which was the taupe table and hung the picture of Christ. But you know at indies Hall there were many activities so there were many times we came on Sunday morning when the skeletons and the scarecrows were hanging from the night before and the party effects of some of those big parties were still around in the kitchen and on the floor. But I also might say that very soon many of the men started volunteering to help set up or at least to take down on Sunday morning. So very early there were many volunteers that helped out and Roy was the kind who put in the bulletin right away if you would like to volunteer for flowers or for ushers or greeting and people right away began to share in that. I might mention that the first service was October 1st. Now how did people know about it? During the summer my husband had actually gone door to door with the flyer that had been made up that told something about each one of us, told something about the Covenant, and told something about the anticipated services that would be starting October 1st in Indies Hall. We also attended many of the activities during the summer and got acquainted with the people. The park was new, as you know, in April of '72 and on through the summer and we just became like a little family, everybody together as the new people were coming in and we became acquainted with the people and attending the various activities here. The first Sunday we had flowers placed on the altar by Roy's parents in honor of our first service, and we must have had

some volunteer ushers and greeters, some of this is a little vague, but I'm sure we did, and I know we had a bulletin.

Mary Ankrom

Did you have music?

MaryAnn

Yes, we had an organist that had played at Lake Village, Dorothy Young, who became our organist and was most helpful in those early years, and we also had a very lovely catholic lady, named Ethel Coyne, who had sung in the Lake Village church groups there. She sang whenever we didn't have other music. Now Roy was one who was calling other churches and finding different types of music they had so we had special music from many churches and different kinds of music.

How did you get your choir started and where did you practice?

MaryAnn

Now that took a few starts. We, of course, soon thought it would be nice to have a choir. In the bulletin we announced anyone interested in singing we were going to meet. The only place that we knew was up on the stage where there was a piano in Indies Hall. You know the activities that are held in Indies Hall now, well it was just as busy in the very beginning also. So we tried to get together a group and somehow it just didn't materialize. So, we didn't have music for some time with a choir. But we tried with Dorothy Young playing the piano up there and I think Barbara Stroebel maybe was one of the first ones that was up there. We tried to sing but it just didn't go, there was so much noise and so much confusion that we couldn't do it. And so, we kind of dropped the idea for a while, but then we tried it again thinking that we wanted to have a choir for Easter of '73. Ellen Evans had moved into the park, and she invited us to her home. This is where we first began to really get something going for a choir, when we could practice in her home. We enjoyed doing that for a quite sometime until we moved to the Bay House. It was a struggle to get something going. Ellen Evans was our first choir director and then in the first part of 1976, Julie Zielke or Julie Meyers as she was then, became our choir director. It was interesting because Dorothy Young like playing for us and we wanted to get Ellen Evans in as the organist and Dorothy really didn't want to give up the job, so we had to kind of work the two of them together in the beginning saying to her that we really needed to have somebody who was in the park because this would be important for our congregation. And then, of course, Ellen became our organist with a couple of times in between when we had someone else serving.

Mary Ankrom

MaryAnn, you had mentioned how valuable Barbara Stroebel was in many things in the beginning. If any of you have been to a memorial service, Barbara Stroebel did every single one of those beautiful letters on the banner, cut them out. First of all, Barbara, is a retired librarian, and she researched to find out exactly what type of letter should go on that kind of a banner, then she made those letters, cut them out and that is what we have today, and we thank you

Barbara. But MaryAnn wants to tell us some of the other thing that Barbara did in the very beginning.

MaryAnn

Barbara was most helpful in many areas. In the very beginning Roy had somehow put together a little committee that was responsible for flowers and cards for the sick and shut-ins. Some of you remember Sandy Stevens Adamski. I hate to mention names because so many are gone, but she was here long enough and quite active that you might remember her, June Anker, Vee Hill, the local artist, she and Bill lived in the park at that time, then they moved out. Barbara was one of the first ones in the choir, she was the one who prepared the parchment where the charter members signed, she also did the first flower chart that was started in 1975. She was responsible for that which is not a continuing thing, and of course, was just so very supportive in so many ways and we really appreciated her. I am going to mention a couple of names – I mentioned Sandy Stevens – the Sunshine Committee or Fund actually started – first of all we had these three people who you were supposed to tell them if you knew of somebody sick so they could send cards. Well then pretty soon we decided we needed some money, so the bulletin said if they wanted to give some money for the Sunshine Fund and then, of course, this evolved into the Sunshine Committee of Bay Indies. But those first few people were sending cards and we would put in the bulletin the people that were sick because there weren't that many or people that they had sent cards to. There were so many things that started out small and we grew with the park. The blood bank was another factor. Now Roy had given blood in the past and in past churches, and I'm assuming there was need for blood for one of the church members or something because that's how it started out that he gave blood, and he asked if there was anyone else who would be willing to give and pretty soon we started a fund for the church. Then there was a fund started for Bay Indies itself and the two merged together. Also at this time, with the Sunshine Fund and the blood bank, the blood pressure checks started. Sandy Stevens was a former nurse, I believe and Army nurse, and she got that thing going so that the blood pressure checks were taken, and these records were kept. She got assistance to help her and that started really very early in the church year too. Actually, it seemed like just about everything started in the years 1972 and 1973. We had our first candlelight service; we had our first Easter breakfast. Were any of you here when we had the sunrise service outside under the canopy in front of Indies Hall? We had the sunrise Easter service right in the front under the covered canopy and I had the bright idea, why don't we serve breakfast. So, we made one of these baked cheese dishes and I got different ladies to make them that lived fairly close to Indies Hall, so they could be baking them and then I made two or three of them that we put in the kitchen in Indies Hall. We had people sign up and we decorated tables and we had over 100 people that turned out. We reimbursed the people for the egg dish \$1.50. I just came across that paper, and I saw that, and I thought "Oh brother." The following sunrise service, the Masons for the next two years served the breakfast. We were kind of glad because it was over 200 by the next year for the Easter sunrise service. After that the church went back and we didn't serve quite as much for breakfast for the Easter sunrise and the men, of course, had to be out there wiping those chairs because it got damp. They were set up early and with the dew – we had these towels, and they were wiping off the chairs, so soon we had to move inside for the service. But they brought the piano or the organ close to the doorway there and they were able to put a loudspeaker system out there and we had a beautiful sunrise service. Now that bring to mind some of the coffee hours. The first coffee hour we had it was my

birthday. I may as well tell you it was my 40th birthday coming up on October 8th. So, my husband talked to Vee Hill and asked her if she would be willing to help serve coffee after church and unbeknownst to me, they ordered a cake and so our first coffee hour, on the second Sunday of October was at Indies Hall with cake and coffee for my birthday. And we continued to have that coffee hour. I think Roy knew, just as we know, that you don't get acquainted just saying "hello" on Sunday morning to the people. To really learn to be concerned about one another, to love one another, you have to get better acquainted. He was big on fellowship. There were a lot of eating things, but we started the coffee hour on the second Sunday in October and that continued with volunteers baking and serving. Then pretty soon there was a bigger attendance and so we decided we had to buy the refreshments. We used Olsen's bakery down in South Venice, a wonderful bakery, and we always got our coffee cakes there and then we would put a dish out and people might drop something in. Eventually they did away with the dish and just took it out of the treasury. But it was ongoing thing from that second Sunday of services. We also had a Fall dinner right away. I think that would have been in October of '73 where we were celebrating like a one-year anniversary. Buffalo Bill catered that first dinner as he has done many since then. We continued to have some type of a Fall dinner; Roy might have called them Fellowship dinners. He had these things where fellowship came up often. Fellowship and food was important to him. We had a lot of activities.

Mary Ankrom

It makes me very proud to know that our church started some of these programs that are still going on and are so helpful to people – Sunshine Club, Blood Bank – these two things are very important for the people here in the park. MaryAnn, since these ladies are Covenant Women, can you tell us something about how this group got started?

MaryAnn

I'm a little vague about that because as I was teaching, I was not able to be involved in this as I might have liked to be. But it took a couple of years before the ladies decided to get together and they formed a group called Ladies Fellowship. They met, I believe, in the fall of '75 for their first meeting. They then went ahead and had an afternoon group that met for projects. I do not know what some of these projects were, but I do know that in the beginning they sold fruit cakes and napkins. After the Sunday services, they had tables and that's how they got started raising a little bit of money for their projects. Then they also had study and share groups that met in the homes, and Bible Study. Kelly and Arlene Langer were active in the church and I believe Arlene led those Bible Study groups in the home of Hazel Pine and other people and pretty soon they started meeting together, men and women. The women organized and they called themselves Women's Fellowship and I believe Pauline Laramer was the first chairman after they became organized. Of course, they were very active from the beginning serving in many capacities just as they are doing now.

Mary Ankrom

We could go on and on asking MaryAnn questions, but we do not want to keep you ladies all afternoon. Are there any particular questions that you would like to ask MaryAnn? This is your opportunity, she's right here.

Mary Ankrom

Where did you live MaryAnn?

MaryAnn

When we came here because our children were teenagers, we, of course, did not have the option of living in one of the mobile home parks. We came, having lived in parsonages all of our married life, didn't have any big savings, we came here owing a government loan for my college, owing moving expenses, getting what we thought was terrific, we were going to be given \$200 allowances from the Covenant for finding a place to live. And in those days, we just couldn't find anything. There were only two bedroom homes and when you have a teenage boy and girl, no office, no den, my husband's car was his office to start with, and before we moved down here he came down and called up and said "I can't find anything, but there's a two bedroom house and there's a carport and we can stack our boxes in there. They are willing to paint it any color we wanted, and I guess David would just have to just park in the dining area." But there was nothing available. Then Rev. Elder Anderson, an older Covenant pastor, stepped in and said, "You just can't do this."

He took Roy out and they found a place in Venice Gardens that a man had just purchased and was going to use for rental purposes for his parents eventually and we were able to rent this home and then we borrowed money from my mother, and his folks, bought a lot, built a home. And I will have to tell you, I am a crybaby. When we went in to sign for that loan for the house, I cried. How are we ever going to do this? Well, we built a home in Venice Gardens, and we lived there. Eventually, there was a little spot in Indies Hall where they would let my husband put a small desk. They bought a used mimeograph machine between Venice Isle and Bay Indies, and they parked that there. Pretty soon he had an office over in the beehive, then he had one some other place, then he ended above Venetian Cleaners with an office suite there for several years. So we lived in Venice Gardens, then moved to Bird Bay, and then to Pinebrook.

Mary Ankrom

MaryAnn, how many people did you have for the first Sunday service?

MaryAnn

I think there were 38 people the first Sunday, which was not bad and I believe the charter membership included 50 total full members and 19 associate members, but, of course, this was not until late '74 when the charter membership closed and we became incorporated as a church, I guess you would say, and then we became a Covenant Church in the Southeast Conference and Evangelical Covenant Church in '75. Yes, we had a small turnout, maybe even down in the 20's in the summer for a couple of years, but mostly about 30-40. It was a small group in that big Indies Hall you can imagine. But we were happy to move here to this building, which was much, more home like with the smaller group and the congregation continued to grow.

Mary Ankrom

This has been a delightful program and MaryAnn we appreciate it so very, very much and maybe some other time we can have another half an hour of tea with MaryAnn. Thank you very much.

In 1972 I was called as Developer Pastor to Mobile home parks in Venice, Florida. I founded the Bay Indies, ECC and Venice Isle ECC. I served as their pastor for sixteen years until cancer related health problems made it necessary to retire. In each of my pastorates I became involved in local ministerium and local projects with Protestant Welfare services, Salvation Army, Bill Graham Evangelical Association. Also, youth activities and elder affairs. My concern and support of World Missions throughout my ministry was the vision for the church "To Know HIM and to make HIM Known".

I actively served in various roles in ECC Conferences, particularly lowa and Southeast Conference. I enjoyed my ministry in Venice and felt blessed to have been a developer Pastor.

Thus for almost ten years Ed Johnson and Paul Johnson (Johnson & Johnson) led the church's pastoral work. During that period the church's membership nearly doubled. As one person put it "When we tired of one, the other took over and we liked that."

After his graduation from North Park College and Seminary Paul had spent most of his life in the Navy beginning in WWII and ending in the late 70's retiring with 29 years of service. Almost $frac{1}{2}$ ten of those years were with the Marine Corps, 4-1/2 years with the Coast Guard Academy as well as with several ships and submarines. In civilian life he was Chaplain of Minnehaha Academy twice as well as Superintendent of the East Coast Conference of the Covenant Church.

Paul was ordained in 1952, married Barbara in '53 and is the Father of 5 wonderful children, Grandfather to 13 and Great-Grandfather to 10. "My Bay Indies living and working were some of the happiest of my life."




Throughout his career he served on a number of conference and denominational boards, including as chairperson of the Covenant Board of Missions and the executive board of the Pacific Southwest Conference.




